


D.H. Lawrence's controversial classic, *The Rainbow*, follows the lives and loves of three generations of the Brangwen family, between 1840 and 1905. Their tempestuous relationships are played out against a backdrop of change as they witness the arrival of industrialisation – the only constant being their unending attempts to grasp a higher form of existence, symbolised by the persistent, unifying motif of the 'rainbow'. Lawrence's fourth novel, and the prequel to *Women in Love*, is an invigorating, absorbing tale about the undying determination of the human soul.



Paul Slack originally trained as a bricklayer in his native Nottinghamshire. He has just completed work on the film *Alleycats*, a London-based thriller, and the romantic fantasy film *Fallen*, directed by Scott Hicks. *Inside the Mind of Mr D.H. Lawrence*, a film based on his acclaimed solo play *Phoenix Rising*, which toured nationally and internationally, premiered at the Broadway Cinema in Nottingham last year as part of the D.H. Lawrence Festival. Paul has worked extensively in theatre, most notably in the West End, at the West Yorkshire Playhouse, Bristol Old Vic, English Touring Theatre, the RSC and the Hammersmith Lyric. He is a regular contributor to radio drama and has read D.H. Lawrence's *Sons and Lovers* for Naxos AudioBooks.
